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Client Profile: Meet Sehan

When Sehan had surgery for breast cancer, she did not immediately tell her children because she wanted them to concentrate on school and not worry about her. When they asked why she was not working, "I told them my arm hurts,'' she recalled.

The surgery and radiation treatment made it difficult for Sehan to stand continuously in front of a hot stove, forcing her to quit her job as

a restaurant chef. Her husband's income from a part-time job at a parking lot was not enough for the family. So they turned to Food Pantry LAX after the couple's eldest daughter found it through an Internet search.

"It really helps," said Sehan, who lives in Inglewood and has four children, ages 8 to 16. She does not drive, so she can come only if her husband or daughter is free to drive her.

Sehan grew up in Lebanon and came to the United States in 2006. "I came for my kids,'' she said, explaining that with financial aid it is more feasible to attend college in the United States than in her native country. She took ESL courses to burnish her English, became a citizen and began working in restaurants, sometimes up to three different ones at the same time.

But a routine mammogram early in 2017 brought bad news. She had surgery in March of that year. She told the children of her diagnosis that summer, after the school year had ended.

Now Sehan is well enough to work but says that finding a job at her age, 55, has been tough. "They need young,'' she said.

If she needs a job recommendation, she could get one from the staff at Food Pantry LAX. To thank the food pantry for helping her family, Sehan occasionally brings the staff a plate of her homemade tabbouleh, a Middle Eastern parsley salad. It is delicious! Page 2

In Loving Memory: Dorothy Nino, 1934 - 2019

Food Pantry LAX lost part of its heart and soul in February when Dorothy Nino, an extremely long-serving and dedicated volunteer, passed away from congestive heart failure at age 84.

Dorothy began volunteering at the pantry in 1987, only two years after it was started by the Westchester-Ladera Clergy Association. At one point several years ago, it seemed as if Dorothy were running the pantry singlehandedly – shopping for food, picking up donations, coordinating volunteer schedules, planning the menus, handling the banking, submitting required monthly reports, even recording the temperatures of the refrigerators and freezers to make sure they complied with health regulations.

Dorothy Jean Bell was born in Winnipeg, Canada on March 8, 1934. After high school she attended the Winnipeg General Hospital School of Nursing. Then, wanting to escape the cold weather, she and three friends moved to sunny California – to Fresno at first, but then eventually to Los Angeles, where she raised three children.

In 1987, having retired from nursing and with her children grown, Dorothy was looking for something new to do when she saw a sign at a church recruiting volunteers for a still fledgling operation to distribute food to the needy. She stayed for 32 years.

Many volunteers from the food pantry attended the memorial celebration of Dorothy's life, held in the backyard of her house in Westchester. Scott Tanner, president of the pantry, spoke at the event, recalling how he had become mildly alarmed when he first realized how dependent the pantry was on a single person. "I'm so grateful she was a part of my life," he said.

Dorothy is survived by her three children – Susan Guillo, Jeff Nino and Michelle Schroder, and three grandchildren. Even in death, Dorothy is helping feed the hungry – the family requests that memorial donations be made to Food Pantry LAX.

His mother, while still in the hospital after giving birth to him, heard someone being colled Chip and decided that would be a great nickname for her son as well. During his career Chip was a software developer, mainly for Citicorp and Colonial Life Insurance. He and his wife, Deborah, came to Los Angeles in 2007 to be clos- er to their two children, who had moved here for career and climate reasons, and their three grandchildren. But the couple always envisioned retiring in the Southeast, where they had spent many happy years. So at the end of April, Chip and Deborah moved to South- port, N.C., ten minutes from the Atlantic Ocean. "One of the hardest parts is leaving here," Chip said, referring to Food Pantry LAX.
